



Community funding of a new CT scanner

You are a Fellow who is supporting a regional hospital's DMS on short-term secondment at a small outlying hospital of 30 beds. It serves a population dominated by retired people who are, on the whole, reasonably affluent. They are also articulate, and there is considerable dissatisfaction with the long delays they face in obtaining CT scans from the Base Hospital. There is no private provider of CT services in your town. You have been made aware of the long waiting times and are awaiting a response from the Head of Department for Medical Imaging at your Base Hospital, as to what can be done to improve the situation.

A community committee has apparently been formed in response to widespread dissatisfaction with the long delays, which resulted in a community group forming to "take control of the situation". You are unaware of this until their representatives come to see you with a proposal to fund a local CT scanner. They have done considerable background work; they have lobbied for local political support, contacted manufacturers for an indication of the likely cost, and begun submitting funding applications for grants to charitable trusts and service organisation. They present to you in a somewhat jubilant mode, as they already have promises of funding for the majority of their estimate of the cost.

- 2. How would you manage the governance of this project?
- 3. How would you manage community expectations?
